

Community Christian School Wellness Policy

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to set forth methods that promote student wellness, prevent and reduce childhood obesity, and assure that school meals and other food and beverages sold and otherwise made available on the school campus during the school day are consistent with applicable minimum local, state, and federal standards.

II. GENERAL STATEMENT OF POLICY

- A. The school board recognizes that nutrition promotion and education, physical activity, and other school-based activities that promote student wellness are essential components of the educational process and that good health fosters student attendance and learning.
- B. The school environment should promote students' health, well-being, and ability to learn by encouraging healthy eating and physical activity.
- C. The school district encourages the involvement of parents, students, representatives of the school food authority, teachers, school health professionals, the school board, school administrators, and the general public in the development, implementation, and periodic review and update of the school district's wellness policy.
- D. Children need access to healthy foods and opportunities to be physically active in order to grow, learn, and thrive.
- E. All students in grades K-12 will have opportunities, support, and encouragement to be physically active on a regular basis.
- F. Qualified Food and Nutrition Services personnel will provide students with access to a variety of affordable, nutritious, and appealing foods that meet the health and nutrition needs of students; try to accommodate the religious, ethnic, and cultural diversity of the student body in meal planning; and will provide clean, safe, and pleasant settings and adequate time for students to eat.

III. WELLNESS GOALS

- A. Nutrition and Physical Activity Promotion and Education
 1. The school district will encourage and support a healthy lifestyle for students by engaging in nutrition education and physical activity that is:
 - a. Aligned with established local, state, and/or national curriculum standards for grades K-12;
 - b. offered as part of a comprehensive program designed to provide students with the knowledge and skills necessary to promote and protect their health;
 - c. part of health and physical education classes, as well as classroom instruction in subjects such as math, science, language arts, social sciences, and elective subjects, where appropriate; and
 - d. enjoyable, developmentally appropriate, culturally relevant, fosters lifelong habits of physical activity and includes participatory activities, such as contests, promotions, taste testing, the Healthy Family Newsletter, and field trips.
- B. Nutrition Education
 1. The school district will encourage all students to make age appropriate, healthy selections of foods and beverages, including those sold individually outside the reimbursable school meal programs, such as through a la carte choices, snack lines, vending machines, and fundraising events.

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2. The School District will establish and maintain a Staff Wellness Committee, which will develop, promote, and oversee a multifaceted plan to promote staff health and wellness and to encourage staff to be role models for healthy behaviors.
 3. The School District, to the extent possible, will buy and feature locally grown farm fresh foods; incorporate nutrition education curriculum; and provide students with experiential learning opportunities.
- C. Physical Activity and Education
1. Students need opportunities for physical activity and to fully embrace regular physical activity as a personal behavior. Toward that end, health and physical education will reinforce the knowledge and self-management skills needed to maintain a healthy lifestyle and reduce sedentary activities, such as watching television.
 2. Opportunities for physical activity will be incorporated into other subject lessons, where appropriate.
 3. Classroom teachers will provide short physical activity breaks between lessons or classes, as appropriate as documented in teacher lesson plans.
 4. The school district discourages using or withholding activity as a punishment.
- D. Communications with Parents
1. The school district recognizes that parents and guardians have a primary role in promoting their children's health and well-being.
 2. The school district will support parents' efforts to provide a healthy diet and daily physical activity for their children.
 3. The school district encourages parents to pack healthy lunches and snacks and refrain from including beverages and foods without nutritional value.
 4. The school district will provide information about physical education and other school-based physical activity opportunities and will support parents' efforts to provide their children with opportunities to be physically active outside of school.

IV. STANDARDS AND NUTRITION GUIDELINES

A. School Meals

1. The school district will provide healthy and safe Breakfast and Lunch meal programs. Breakfast and Lunch along with other meal programs will comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, rules, and regulations.
2. Food service personnel will provide students with access to a variety of affordable, nutritious, and appealing foods that meet the health and nutrition needs of students.
3. Food service personnel will try to accommodate the religious, ethnic, and cultural diversity of the student body in meal planning.
4. Food service personnel will provide clean, safe, and pleasant settings.
5. Food service personnel will take every measure to ensure that student access to foods and beverages meets or exceeds all applicable federal, state, and local laws, rules, and regulations and those reimbursable school meals meet USDA nutrition standards.
6. Food service personnel shall adhere to all applicable federal, state, and local food safety and security guidelines.
7. The school district will make every effort to eliminate any social stigma attached to, and prevent the overt identification of, students who are eligible for free and reduced-price school meals. All students will be fed regardless of their school lunch balance. Food and Nutrition Services will utilize electronic identification and payment systems, promote the availability of school meals to all students; and/or offer nontraditional methods of serving school meals.
8. The school district will provide students access to hand washing or hand sanitizing before they eat meals or snacks.

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9. The school district will make every effort to provide students with sufficient time to eat after sitting down for school meals and will schedule meal periods at appropriate times during the school day.
 10. The school district will discourage tutoring, club, or organizational meetings or activities during mealtimes unless students may eat during such activities.
- B. Free and Reduced Meal Application
- a. Applications for Free and Reduced meals are sent home at the beginning of the school year. They are also available at back to school night, and in the front office throughout the year.
- C. School Food Service Program/Personnel
1. The Director of Food and Nutrition Services will be responsible for the school district's Food and Nutrition Services program, whose duties shall include the creation of nutrition guidelines and procedures for the selection of foods and beverages with input from the Assistant Director to ensure food and beverage choices made available on campus are consistent with current USDA guidelines.
 2. As part of the school district's responsibility to operate a Food and Nutrition Services (FNS) program, the school district will provide continuing professional development for all FNS personnel employed in the schools to meet USDA professional standards requirement.
- D. Competitive Foods and Beverages
1. All foods and beverages sold on school grounds to students outside of reimbursable meals, are considered "competitive". Competitive foods and beverages include items sold a la carte in the cafeteria, from vending machines, school stores, and for in-school fundraisers. No competitive foods and beverages may be sold during the school day from midnight prior to 30 minutes after the end of the official school day.
 2. All competitive foods and beverages sold to K-12 students will meet the USDA Smart Snacks in School (Smart Snacks) nutrition standards and any applicable state nutrition standards, at a minimum. Smart Snacks aim to improve student health and well-being, increase consumption of healthful foods during the school day, and create an environment that reinforces the development of healthy eating habits for all students.  3. Before and Aftercare (child care) programs must also comply with the USDA and Smart Snack standards unless they are reimbursable under USDA school meals program, in which case they must comply with all applicable USDA standards.
- E. Other Foods and Beverages Made Available to Students
1. Student wellness will be a consideration for all foods and beverages offered, but not sold, to students on the school campus, including those foods provided through:
 - a. Celebrations and parties. The school district will provide a list of healthy party ideas to parents and teachers, including non-food celebration ideas.
 - b. Classroom snacks brought by parents. The school district will provide upon request to parents a list of suggested foods and beverages that meet Smart Snacks nutrition standards.
 2. Rewards and incentives. Schools will use foods or beverages as rewards for academic performance or good behavior sparingly and will not withhold food or beverages as punishment. The school district will make available upon request a list of positive, nonfood rewards. Food and beverages will not be withheld as punishment.
 3. Fundraising. The school district will make available to parents and teachers a list of suggested healthy fundraising ideas upon request.
 4. When planning a field trip that will occur during the scheduled lunch periods, the classroom teacher will, to the extent possible, collaborate with Food and Nutrition Services to provide families the option of receiving a meal from school.

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5. Free drinking water will be made available to students and staff for self-service in or near the cafeteria and throughout the school building.
- F. Food and Beverage Marketing in Schools
1. School-based marketing will be consistent with nutrition education and health promotion.
 2. Schools will restrict food and beverages marketing to the promotion of only those foods and beverages that meet the Smart Snacks nutrition standards.

V. WELLNESS LEADERSHIP AND COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

- A. Wellness Coordinator-CCS Principal
1. The superintendent will designate a school district official to oversee the school district's wellness-related activities (Assistant Food Director of Food and Nutrition). The Wellness Coordinator will ensure that each school implements the policy.
 2. The principal of each school, or a designated school official on the Wellness Committee, will ensure compliance within the school and will report to the Wellness Coordinator regarding compliance matters upon request.
- B. Public Involvement
1. The Wellness Coordinator will allow parents, students, representatives of the school food authority, teachers of physical education, school health professionals, the school board, school administrators, and the general public to participate in the development, implementation, and periodic review and update of the wellness policy.
 2. The Wellness Coordinator will hold meetings, from time to time, for the purpose of discussing the development, implementation, and periodic review and update of the wellness policy. All meeting dates and times will be posted on the school district's media sources and will be open to the public.

VI. POLICY IMPLEMENTATION AND MONITORING

- A. Implementation and Publication
1. After approval by the school board, the wellness policy will be implemented throughout the school district.
 2. The school district will post its wellness policy on its website, to the extent it maintains a website.
- B. Annual Reporting
- The Wellness Coordinator will annually inform the Community Christian School Community about the content and implementation of the wellness policy and make the policy and any updates to the policy available to the public via Eagle Eye School Newsletter.
- C. Triennial Assessment
1. At least once every three years, the school district will evaluate compliance with the wellness policy to assess the implementation of the policy and create a report that includes the following information:
 - a. the extent to which schools under the jurisdiction of the school district are in compliance with the wellness policy;
 - b. the extent to which the school district's wellness policy compares to model local wellness policies; and
 - c. a description of the progress made in attaining the goals of the school district's wellness policy.
 2. The Wellness Coordinator with input from the Wellness Committee will be responsible for conducting the triennial assessment.
 3. The triennial assessment report shall be posted on the school district's website or otherwise made available to the public.

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4. Updates to the Wellness Policy will be made according to the triennial assess findings, or as needed by the committee.

D. Recordkeeping

The school district will retain records to document compliance with the requirements of the wellness policy. The records to be retained include, but are not limited to:

1. The school district's written wellness policy.
2. Documentation demonstrating compliance with community involvement requirements, including requirements to make the local school wellness policy and triennial assessments available to the public.
3. Documentation of the triennial assessment of the local school wellness policy for each school under the school district's jurisdiction efforts to review and update the wellness policy (including an indication of who is involved in the update and methods the school district uses to make stakeholders aware of their ability to participate on the Wellness Committee).
